# Tarcisius's Teaching.

Did you know that not so long-ago Epiphany was a higher feast than Christmas? In fact, it is logical: quite no one knew about what happens on Christmas day until the Epiphany. *Christmastide* is pretty short: 12 days... meanwhile *Epiphanytide* last 3 to 6 weeks.

Traditionally *Epiphanytide* commences on the evening of January 5th with a vigil – one of the four principal vigils of the entire liturgical year.

Originally, adults were baptized on one of the three great vigils: *Easter*, *Pentecost* and *Epiphany*. At this occasion the water of the baptismal font was blessed, a part put aside for different blessings, and the part left consecrated for baptisms.

With time passing by, the Pentecost lost its Water Blessing; and Epiphany its Water Consecration, in order to keep the fullness to Easter.

Epiphany is a culmination for the Christmas season and one of the major Christian feast days in the entire liturgical year. It was a Holy Day of Obligation in the United States until 1885. Epiphany simultaneously recalls the arrival of the Magi to worship the Child Christ, our Lord's Baptism at age 30, and His first public miracle in Cana.

There are many local traditions to celebrate the Epiphany. But that will be for another time.
