3RD SUNDAY OF LENT

In the Gospel of this Sunday, as soon as Jesus had cast out the devil, the man recovered his speech, for the possession had made him dumb. It is an image of what happens to a sinner who will not, or dare not, confess his sin. If he confessed it, and asked pardon, he would be delivered from the tyranny which now oppresses him. Alas! how many there are who are kept back by a dumb devil from making the Confession that would save them! The holy Season of Lent is advancing; these days of grace are passing away; let us profit by them; and if we ourselves be in the state of grace, let us offer up our earnest prayers for sinners, that they may speak, that is, may accuse themselves in Confession, and obtain pardon.

Let us also listen, with holy fear, to what our Savior tells us with regard to our invisible enemies. They are so powerful and crafty that our resistance would be useless, unless we had God on our side, and His holy Angels, who watch over us and join us in the great combat. It was to these unclean and hateful spirits of hell that we delivered ourselves when we sinned: we preferred their tyrannical sway to the sweet and light yoke of our compassionate Redeemer. Now we are set free, or are hoping to be so; let us thank our Divine Liberator; but let us take care not to readmit our enemies. Our Savior warns us of our They will return to the attack; they will endeavor to force their entrance into our soul, after it has been sanctified by the Lamb of the Passover. If we be watchful and faithful, they will be confounded, and leave us: but if we be tepid and careless, if we lose our appreciation of the grace we have received, and forget our obligations to Him who has saved us, our defeat is inevitable; and as our Lord says, our "last state is to be worse than the first."

Would we avoid such a misfortune? Let us meditate upon those other words of our Lord, in today's Gospel: "He that is not with me is against me." What makes us fall back into the power of Satan, and forget our duty to our God, is that we do not frankly declare ourselves for Jesus, when occasions require us to do so. We try to be on both sides, we have recourse to subterfuge, we temporize: this takes away our energy; God no longer gives us the abundant graces we received when we were loyal and generous; our relapse is all but certain. Therefore, let us be boldly and be unmistakably with Christ. He that is a soldier of Jesus should be proud of his title!

LENTEN REGULATIONS TO OBSERVE

- 1. Ash Wednesday (March 2, AD 2022) and Good Friday (April 15, AD 2022) are days of COMPLETE ABSTINENCE FROM MEAT AND ARE ALSO DAYS OF FAST, that is, only one full meal is allowed with no eating between meals. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's needs but they together should not equal that of the full meal.
- 2. The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat (unless a 1st class feast, ie. solemnity, falls on Friday, per canon 1251)
- 3. The obligation to **abstain from meat** binds on all who have reached the age of 14.
- 4. The obligation to **fast** binds all between the ages of 18 and 59.
- 5. Unless there is a just reason, the obligation to do penance is a serious one and no Catholic should lightly excuse himself from this obligation in the Lenten season. Practices of Lenten penances and acts of mortification, increased devotion and prayer, and acts of mercy, charity and almsgiving, are worthy elements of our preparation for Easter.
- 6. Abstinence on all Fridays of the year (outside of the Lenten season), though not obligatory under pain of sin, is "especially recommended".
- 7. Fasting on weekdays of Lent, though not obligatory under pain of sin, is "strongly recommended" (National Conference of Catholic Bishops, November 18, 1966).
- 8. Catholics, after having received their 1st Holy Communion, are bound by the obligation of receiving Holy Communion at least once a year. This precept should be fulfilled during the Easter Season (between the First Sunday of Lent and Trinity Sunday).
- 9. Catholics are also bound to confess mortal sins at least once a year, but this is not limited to the Lenten/Easter Season. We must be well disposed to receive our Lord each time at Holy Communion and therefore it is strongly recommended to go to confession frequently (at least once a month).

Let us be witnesses of faith

The devil is real and we must be on our The greatest achievement of the devil is that he has deceived so many into thinking that he does not exist! He is very happy to be thought of as a cute little red guy with catlike ears, a pointy tail, and matching pitchfork. Of course, he does exist, but deception is second nature to him, for he is the "Father of Lies." Our Lord tells us today, "He who is not with me is against me; and he who gathers not with me, scatters." It is good for us to receive such teaching, because one of the greatest errors of our time is the idea that "compromise" is always a good and virtuous thing. We are in the world but we are not of the world. We have to earn a living. We have to live in peace with our neighbor; these people around us may not be Catholic, but that must not change the nature of our faith, of our behavior, nor our responsibilities. If we must earn our living among pagans, that is not an excuse to be a pagan. Nonetheless, all of our responsibilities in the world ought to be carried out with the intention of "having the Word of God and keeping it". We cannot keep the Commandments by only keeping a few of them; nor by keeping most of them; not even by keeping the most "popular" ones. The demands of truth and morality operate at all the levels of our society. As baptized Catholics, particularly if we have been confirmed, we have the duty to support objective truth and morality. Each of us has the duty to keep the Commandments, and sometimes we have an obligation to remind others of the same responsibilities politely and tactfully, of course, but firmly. Let us ask our Blessed Mother for the strength to be courageous witnesses of the Faith. She is indeed blessed because, by fidelity to the Word of God, she deflected the devil and cast him away from the world.

Dear Faithful of Saint Patrick Oratory,

What are the prayers we say after Mass?

After a Low Mass (when it is celebrated without the organ), the Celebrant leads the faithful in reciting the Leonine Prayers. They are called such after Pope Leo XIII, who after being granted a vision of Satan's plan to attack the Church from within and from without, asked these prayers to be said: Three Hail Marys, the Hail Holy Queen, a prayer for the safeguard of Holy Mother Church, the St. Michael Prayer, and an Invocation to the Sacred Heart (said thrice).

We continue to maintain praying the St. Michael Prayer after all Masses by decree of the Archbishop of Hartford.

Are there not more prayers after every Mass that we say here at St. Patrick Oratory?

Yes. At St. Patrick's, more prayers are recited after every Mass, and not just during a This is because we are an Low Mass. Apostolate of the Institute of Christ the King Sovereign Priest, a worldwide Society of Apostolic Life, in addition to being Oratory established by the Archdiocese. such, we recite the Memorare (a favorite prayer of St. Francis de Sales, Patron of the Institute). We recite this prayer in union with all of the Institute of Christ the King Apostolates across America for the intention of our U.S. Superior. In addition, at all Masses (except for feasts of 1st Class, Octaves, anniversaries of the dedication of our own St. Patrick Church [January 18] and the dedication of the Cathedral Church of Hartford [May 15], Requiem Masses, and some 2nd Class feasts), we add an additional collect, secret, postcommunion, after the collect of any occurring and after commemorations of saints for the Sovereign Pontiff as commanded by our Institute.
