## OCTOBER 3 IS THE TRADITIONAL FEAST OF SAINT THERESE OF THE CHILD JESUS

*Did you know that our church was once her National Shrine?*

Regarding the decorations, St. Therese of Lisieux, better known as the Little Flower, was the overwhelmingly dominant theme. The narthex alone contained six paintings of her. On the south side of the nave hung a triptych depicting her prominent miracles. A similar triptych on the north side of the nave pictured her dropping roses on the United States, and on the National Shrine of the Little Flower (located in St. Clara Church) in particular. In the north end of the transept hung an original painting of the Little Flower executed by her blood sister, Celine, and framed with "electric shell roses. The Little Flower theme was continued in the main altar as well. The altar was composed of luminous Siena marble, and its focal point was a massive Carrara marble statue of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel. Kneeling to the side of the statue is a smaller statue of a kneeling Little Flower.

The most significant center of the church for devotees of the Little Flower, though, was the National Shrine, located just to the south of the main altar. The shrine was created by a French firm "according to the traditional principles of Shrines of Saints in Europe. The basic structure of the shrine consisted of a marble altar base, supporting four marble pillars roughly five feet tall and united at the top with a row of arches. A statue of the Little Flower stood under the middle arch, Directly above the statue hung a painting of the Little Flower in spiritual ecstasy. Hovering well above the shrine and hanging in front and all around it were chandeliers. But as a guide notes, "The chandeliers are not merely chandeliers, but each is really a rose bush to symbolize her promise to 'let fall from heaven a shower of roses. The shrine housed the largest cache of her relics outside of Lisieux, including locks of her hair, portions of her flesh, portions of her ashes, a piece of her habit, and several bones.

On 8 May 1925, just 28 years after her death, Therese of Lisieux was canonized. This devotional cult exploded after her canonization. Societies and novena cycles sprang up across the city and around the nation. Churches were named after her, thousands of miracles were attributed to her, and tens of thousands of baby girls were named after her. Practically overnight, the Little Flower became a favorite focus of popular piety. St. Clara Church was in the process of being built as the devotional cult took fire, and the form of the church became entangled in the cult's extensive coattails. After Diether became Provincial of the Carmelite Order, he made plans to relocate the shrine from St. Cyril's to the new church he was building. The new shrine he had built and the large collection of relics it contained made it immensely popular with the saint's devotees. Thousands of pilgrims from around the world flocked to St. Clara, many in anticipation of healing miracles. In this exciting rush of a vibrant popular cult, the nascent structure became less a parish church and more a shrine to the Little Flower. Interestingly, the image of St. Clara appeared nowhere in the new building.
