The Way of Penance

The three weeks of Septuagesima should be spent in meditating upon our spiritual infirmities and upon the wounds caused in us by sin, in preparation for entering the penitential season of Lent. The upcoming 40 days of penance seem very long to our poor human nature, but our pride should be sufficiently humbled by the dangers that await impenitent souls, motivating us to enter into a serious spirit of active penance.

Penance consists in contrition of the soul and mortification of the body. The soul has willed the sin; the body has cooperated in its commission. Also, the body will share with the soul either the delights of heaven or the torments of hell. Therefore both should pay homage to the Creator. The soul must be resolved to give up *every* sin; it must heartily grieve over those already committed; it must hate sin and shun the near occasions of sin.

Over the years, Holy Mother Church has seen in her members a frightful decay of supernatural energy. Many complain about abstinence as an inconvenience, fasting as having ill effects, and so the Church made Lenten observances easier. Voluntary fasting, curtailments of food and drink, rest and comforts, and entertainments and amusements are to be practiced. But our daily lives offer us opportunities to practice penances that are more quiet and unostentatious: Yielding to the tastes and customs of others, accepting annoyances cheerfully, concealing our own displeasure, silently bearing our own troubles, patiently listening to the woes of others, doing good works, almsgiving (a combination of a type of prayer and fasting for God, often neglected but far greater than our own fastings), overcoming repugnances, and refusing to take offence, are greatly valued and would less easily tempt us to vainglory than penances we choose ourselves. There are passive penances as well, willingly and lovingly accepting what God wills; sickness, pain, poverty, disappointments, etc.

Those who are "of the world," do not receive this penitential message. They seek an easy comfortable way. But "I am the Way," said Christ. And this Way, the way of penance, requires us to practice self-denial, the dying of self, the taking up of our cross, before we can go before the Father. "No man cometh to the Father save by Me." (John 14:6). Penance has more than atoning value. When our own little crosses are borne in union with the suffering Savior, we help Christ win back His Holy Land of human hearts.

Lenten Regulations

- Ash Wednesday (March 1) & Good Friday (April 14) are days of abstinence from meat and also days of fast, that is, only one full meal is allowed; with no solid food between meals. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's needs but they together should not equal another full meal.**
- The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat**
- The obligation to abstain from meat commences at fourteen years of age.
- The obligation to fast commences at eighteen years of age and ends at fifty-nine years of age.
- Although the faithful enjoy freedom in conscience to excuse themselves for a just cause from these mitigated laws of fast and abstinence, the obligation to do penance is a serious one and **no Catholic should lightly excuse himself/herself from this obligation in Lenten Season.** Practices of Lenten penances and acts of mortification, increased devotion and prayer, and acts of mercy and charity, are worthy elements of our sincere preparation for Easter.

Chair of St. Peter, Feb. 22

Antioch, in Syria, was the capital city of the East where the first Pope of the Catholic Church, Saint Peter, set up his Chair after his departure from Jerusalem. This was at the house of a noble Gentile Christian named Theophilus, the one to whom Saint Luke dedicates his two books: the Third Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles. While not always in residence there, seven years later in the year 42, Saint Peter set up his Chair at Rome at the home of Saint Pudens, a senator, and his mother, Saint Priscilla. Saint Peter occupied his Chair at Rome for twenty-five years, from the year 42 to the year 67, when he was crucified for the Faith.
