
“Behold a dead man was carried out.”

Sunday, September 17, 2017 - Fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost

Feast of St. Januarius, September 19

6:00 p.m. Mass



We know for certain that St. Januarius died for the Faith in the persecution of Diocletian, and to this day God confirms the faith of His Church, and works a continual miracle, through the blood which Januarius shed for Him.

The Saint was Bishop of Beneventum, and on one occasion he traveled to Misenum in order to visit a deacon named Sosius. During this visit Januarius saw a vision of Sosius wearing the crown of martyrdom. Shortly after Sosius was arrested, and thrown into prison. There St. Januarius visited and encouraged him, until he, himself, was arrested. Soon the number of the confessors was swollen by some of the neighboring clergy. They were thrown into a fiery furnace which did them no harm and then exposed to the wild beasts in the amphitheatre with no effect. Timotheus, president of Campania, declaring that this was due to magic, ordered the martyrs to be beheaded, but the persecutor was smitten with blindness; Januarius cured him, and five thousand persons were converted to Christ before the martyrs were decapitated. Little did the heathen think that he was to be the instrument of God's hands, as his actions ushered in the long succession of miracles which attest to the faith of Januarius.

The relics of Januarius were taken to Naples and laid in the chief church there, becoming famous for many miracles. When the blood of St. Januarius, kept dried up in small glass vials is put in sight of the head of the same martyr, it liquefies, and sometimes is said to "boil," and flows like the blood of a living man. It is especially this miracle of the liquefaction which has given celebrity to the name of Januarius. This ceremony is rendered several times a year, in May, in September for the saint's feast, and again in December, when Mount Vesuvius once violently erupted.

The two sealed vials rest inside a reliquary which is topped by a crown and a cross. When the Bishop takes the vial to the Altar that holds the Saint's head, the people, who gather by the thousands, pray that the blood becomes liquid once again. If the miracle takes place, the officiant proclaims, "Il miracolo é fatto!" and waves a white handkerchief. Then a Te Deum is sung and the reliquary is taken to the altar rail so the faithful can kiss the vial.

St. Alphonsus Ligouri said this: "The Lord himself has continued to honor him, by allowing many miracles to be wrought through his intercession, particularly when the frightful eruptions of Mount Vesuvius have threatened the city of Naples with utter destruction. While the relics of St. Januarius were being brought in procession towards this terrific volcano, the torrents of lava and liquid fire which it emitted have ceased, or turned their course from the city. But the most stupendous miracle, and that which is greatly celebrated in the church, is the liquefying and boiling up of this blessed martyr's blood whenever the vials are brought in sight of his head. This miracle is renewed many times in the year, in presence of all who desire to witness it; yet some heretics have endeavored to throw a doubt upon its genuineness, by frivolous and incoherent explanations; but no one can deny the effect to be miraculous, unless he be prepared to question the evidence of his senses."

MONTH OF OUR LADY OF SORROWS

The Church dedicates the month of September to Our Lady of Sorrows. The Blessed Virgin Mary's spiritual martyrdom in virtue of her perfect union with the Passion of Christ is her role in salvation history, and is what merited her place as the spiritual Mother of all Christians. This is symbolized by a single sword, or seven swords, piercing Mary's suffering heart, as foretold in Simeon's prophecy. Traditionally the Church meditates on the "Seven Sorrows" of our Blessed Mother.



As Mary stood at the foot of the Cross on which Jesus hung, the sword of sorrow Simeon had foretold pierced her soul. Below are the seven sorrows of Mary:

1. The prophecy of Simeon (*Luke 2:25-35*)
2. The flight into Egypt (*Matthew 2:13-15*)
3. Loss of the Child Jesus for three days (*Luke 2:41-50*)
4. Mary meets Jesus on his way to Calvary (*Luke 23:27-31; John 19:17*)
5. Crucifixion and Death of Jesus (*John 19:25-30*)
6. The body of Jesus being taken from the Cross (*Psalms 130; Luke 23:50-54; John 19:31-37*)
7. The burial of Jesus (*Isaiah 53:8; Luke 23:50-56; John 19:38-42; Mark 15:40-47*)

In all, the prophesy of Simeon that a sword would pierce our Blessed Mother's heart was fulfilled in these events. For this reason, Mary is sometimes depicted with her heart exposed and with seven swords piercing it. More importantly, each new suffering was received with the courage, love, and trust that echoed her fiat, let it be done unto me according to Thy word, first uttered at the Annunciation.

St. Bernard (d. 1153) wrote; "Truly, O Blessed Mother, a sword has pierced your heart.... He died in body through a love greater than anyone had known. She died in spirit through a love unlike any other since His" (*De duodecim praerogativis BVM*).

Prayer to our Sorrowful Mother for a particular grace

O, Mother most holy and sorrowful, Queen of Martyrs, you who stood by your Son as He agonized on the cross; by the sufferings of your life, by that sword of pain that pierced your heart, by your perfect joy in heaven, look down on me kindly as I kneel before you, sympathizing with your sorrows and offering you my petition with childlike trust.

Dear Mother, since your Son refuses you nothing, ask of His Sacred Heart to mercifully grant what I ask, through the merits of His sacred passion, along with those of your sufferings at the foot of the cross.

Mother most merciful, to whom shall I go in my misery if not to you who pities us poor sinful exiles in this valley of tears? In our name, offer Jesus but one drop of His most precious blood, but one pang of His loving heart. Remind Him that you are our sweetness, our life and our hope, and your prayer will be heard. *Amen*

Symbols: heart pierced with a sword; heart pierced by seven swords; winged heart pierced with a sword; flowers: red rose, iris (meaning: "sword-lily"), cyclamen.

Patron: people named Dolores, Dolais, Deloris, Dolorita, Maria Dolorosa, Pia, and Pieta.

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
