

Indulgences for the Poor Souls

By the practice of Indulgences, the Church places at the charitable disposal of the faithful the inexhaustible treasure accumulated, from age to age, by the superabundant satisfactions of the saints, added to those of the martyrs, and united to those of our Blessed Lady and the infinite residue of our Lord's sufferings. These remissions of punishment she grants to the living by her own direct power; but she nearly always approves of and permits their application to the dead by way of suffrage, that is to say, in the manner in which, as we have seen, each of the faithful may offer to God who accepts it, for another, the suffrage or succor of his own satisfactions.

A partial indulgence, applicable only to the souls in purgatory, can be obtained when the Eternal Rest (*Requiem aeternam*) is prayed. This is a good prayer to recite especially during the month of November:

SAINT FELIX of VALOIS, Nov. 20

Saint Felix was the son of the Count of Valois. His mother carried him to Saint Bernard at his monastery in Clairvaux, to offer him there to God when he was three years old; she kept him, however, under her own care. She permitted him, still young, to distribute the alms she was pleased to give to the poor. When the exiled Pope Innocent II sought refuge in France, the Count of Valois, father of Felix, offered his castle of Crepy to the Pontiff, who often blessed the young child. One day when Felix gave away his own habits to a poor beggar, he found them that evening neatly laid on his bed; and he thanked God for this sign of His divine goodness, proving that one loses nothing when one gives to the poor.

The unfortunate divorce of the parents of Felix, and the excommunication of his father who remarried and whose condemnation raised serious troubles in his domains caused the young man to mature; he then formed a resolution to leave the world. Confiding his mother to her pious brother, Thibault, Count of Champagne, Felix took the Cistercian habit at Clairvaux. His rare virtues drew so much admiration that, with Saint Bernard's consent, he fled from it to Italy where he began to live an austere life with an aged hermit in the Alps. The old hermit was able to procure the ordination of his disciple as a priest.

After his elderly counselor died in his arms, Saint Felix returned to France. He built a cell in the diocese of Meaux in an uninhabited forest, later named Cerfroid. There he led an angelic life of perpetual fasting. God inspired him with the desire of founding an Order for the redemption of Christian captives from the Moors. The Lord also moved Saint John of Matha, a young nobleman of Provence, to seek out the hermit and join him. The two applied themselves to the practice of all virtues. It was John who proposed to Saint Felix the project of an Order for the redemption of captives when Felix was already seventy years old. The latter gladly offered himself to God for that purpose, and after praying for three days the two made a pilgrimage to Rome in the middle of winter. They were kindly received by the Pope after he read the recommendation which the Bishop of Paris had given them. He too prayed and became convinced that the two Saints were inspired by the Holy Spirit, and he gave his approbation to the Trinitarian Order

Within forty years the Order would have six hundred monasteries. St. Felix founded St. Mathburn Convent in Paris in his seventies. Saint John, who was Superior General, left to Saint Felix the direction of the convents in France, exercised from the monastery which the founders had built at Cerfroid. There Saint Felix died in November of 1212, at the age of eighty-five, only about six weeks before his younger co-founder. It is a constant tradition in the Trinitarian Order that Saint Felix and Saint John were canonized by Urban IV in 1260, though no bull has ever been found. In 1219 already the feast of Saint Felix was kept in the entire diocese of Meaux. In 1666 Alexander VI declared that veneration of the servant of God was "immemorial".

A Very Different First Thanksgiving

In 1539, Francisco Coronado organized an expedition from Mexico. Bringing with him 300 soldiers and settlers, 100 native Mexican Christians and five Franciscan missionaries, plus hundreds of horses, mules, sheep, cows, pigs and goats, he set out to explore what is now the great southwest of the United States.

He first established a base in Arizona, discovering the pueblos. He crossed what is now the Rio Grande, naming it *Rio de Nuestra Senora* (the River of Our Lady), and headed east to establish a mission near Albuquerque, New Mexico. Spreading the true faith was his primary purpose in undertaking the expeditions, and he found fertile ground to plant the seeds of faith among the pagan native Indians.

In April, 1541, Coronado and a small group including the missionaries, left Albuquerque, New Mexico heading even further east-northeast, crossing the Texas Panhandle. The natives they encountered were immediately open to the reception of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. And, with only a few weeks of instruction converted and were baptized. Father Juan Padilla, O.F.M., celebrated Mass followed by a thanksgiving feast to God for his blessings in the face of dangers, and for the converts.

Another Thanksgiving celebration occurred in 1598 when Juan de Onate, a Catholic explorer, accompanied by over 200 soldiers, colonists, and their families and eight Franciscan friars, two priests and six brothers, headed into New Mexico from Mexico City, experiencing many hardships and hostile Indians along the way. Just over *Rio de Nuestra Senora* the Franciscans erected a large cross near present-day El Paso, Texas, on the Feast of the Ascension of Our Lord. High Mass commenced immediately afterward, offered in thanksgiving to Almighty God for many blessings. Then they gathered for a banquet of fish, game, fruits, and vegetables. The feast was commemorated by the Spanish in successive years and is still celebrated in San Juan on April 30.

The puritanical Pilgrims, who are credited with the first and famous thanksgiving of 1621 did not make theirs a yearly event. George Washington called for a day of Thanksgiving when president, but it wasn't a national holiday until the presidency of Abraham Lincoln. The Spanish Catholics thanked the true God for bringing them safely through dangers, and for the spreading of the faith and kept their day of thanksgiving annually. On Thanksgiving we should more than pause to recollect and contemplate the blessings we experience spiritually and materially.
