“Behold the birds of the air...”



And, of course, excessive concern for material things might lead to covetousness or even outright theft. Our Lord is simply telling us--in very beautiful language--that we must keep things in perspective.

The birds of the air and the lilies of the field certainly glorify God with their great beauty and majesty. We too glorify God when we complete our daily duties with His honor in mind. Without His honor in mind, our labors will be crass and without glory. But with God's honor as our motivation, our glory will be like the lilies of the field and the birds of the air.

Sunday, August 26, 2018 - Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost



The Beheading of St. John the Baptist Wednesday, August 29. 8:00 a.m. Mass

John the Baptist was born through the intercession of God to Zachariah and Elizabeth, who was otherwise too old to bear children. According to scriptures, the Angel Gabriel visited Elizabeth and Zachariah to tell them they would have a son and that they should name him John. Zachariah was skeptical and for this he was rendered mute until the time his son was born and named John, in fulfillment of God's will.

When Elizabeth was pregnant with John, a cousin of Jesus, she was visited by Mary, and John leapt in her womb. This revealed to Elizabeth that the child Mary carried was to be the Son of God.

His inspired public ministry began around 30 AD. And his mission was to preach repentance to Israel in preparation for the coming of the Messiah. John was known for attracting large crowds across the province of Judaea and around the Jordan River. When Jesus came to him to be baptized, John recognized him and said, "It is I who need baptism from you." Jesus told John to baptize Him anyway, which he did, whereupon the heavens opened, and the Spirit of God was seen like a dove. The voice of God spoke, saying, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased."

John instructed his followers to turn to Christ, calling Him the "Lamb of God" and these people were among the first Christians. Following his baptism of Christ, John's popularity grew so much that he alarmed King Herod. John spoke with Herod on several occasions and when John rebuked King Herod for his unlawful union with Herodias, his brother's wife, Herod had John imprisoned. On his birthday, Herod celebrated with a great feast as Salome, the daughter of Herodias, danced before his guests. Herod, pleased with Salome's performance, promised to give her whatever she asked for, even up to half his kingdom. On the advice of her wicked mother, Salome asked for the head of John the Baptist on a platter. Herod regretfully ordered the execution. St. John the Baptist is the last and greatest of the Old Testament prophets, highly venerated by the Church. The feast of his martyrdom is August 29th.

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St. Rose of Lima, Aug. 30th

Saint Rose, born Isabel De Flores del Oliva in Lima, Peru on 20 April, 1586, and after a life of supreme sufferings, died there August 24th, 1617, having prophesied her own death. She was beatified in 1667, and canonized in 1671, becoming the first saint of the New World. Represented in numerous images wearing a crown of roses or accompanied by the Holy Infant, her feast day is celebrated August 30.

At her confirmation in 1597, she took the name of Rose, because, when an infant, her face was transformed by a mystical rose. As a child she was remarkable for a great reverence, and pronounced love, for all things relating to God. This so took possession of her that thenceforth her life was given up to prayer and mortification. She had an intense devotion to the Infant Jesus and His Blessed Mother, before whose altar she spent hours. She was scrupulously obedient and of untiring industry, making rapid progress by earnest attention to her parents' instruction, to her studies, and to her domestic work.

After reading about St. Catherine she took that saint as her model. She began by fasting three times a week, adding secret severe penances, and when her vanity was assailed, cutting off her beautiful hair, wearing coarse clothing, and roughening her hands. All this time she had to struggle against the objections of her friends, the ridicule of her family, and the censure of her parents. Finally she determined to take a vow of virginity, and inspired by supernatural love, adopted extraordinary means to fulfill it. At the outset she had to combat the opposition of her parents, who wished her to marry well. For ten years the struggle continued before she won, by patience and prayer, their consent to continue her mission.

Mostly St. Rose's days were filled with acts of charity and industry, her exquisite lace and embroidery helping to support her parents, while her nights were devoted to prayer and penance. When her work permitted, she retired to a little grotto which she had built, with her brother's aid, in their small garden. Overcoming the opposition of her parents, and with the consent of her confessor, she was allowed later to become practically a recluse in this cell, save for her daily visits to the Blessed Sacrament.

In her twentieth year St. Rose received the habit of the Third Order St. Dominic. Thereafter she redoubled the severity and variety of her penances to a heroic degree, wearing constantly a metal spiked crown, concealed by roses, and an iron chain about her waist. Days passed without food. When she could no longer stand, she sought repose on a bed constructed by herself, of broken glass, stone, potsherds, and thorns. She admitted that the thought of lying down on it made her tremble with dread. Fourteen years this martyrdom of her body continued without relaxation, but not without consolation. Our Lord revealed Himself to her frequently, flooding her soul with such inexpressible peace and joy as to leave her in ecstasy. At these times she offered to Him all her mortifications and penances in expiation for offences against His Divine Majesty, for the idolatry of her country, for the conversion of sinners, and for the souls in Purgatory.
