I love my future flock; I think of it and already pray for each of its sheep. Where are they? It truly doesn't matter. I'm packing and waiting for my orders.

Nonetheless, I will surely miss Gricigliano. These seminary years have been, as a whole, the most wonderful of my life. I could write a whole book about them. But, if I were to choose a single topic that would somehow condense it all, I would say that here we are taught to truly love the Church. Not as one might imagine it to be, but as it really is, in all its present-day glory and sanctity, in all its sufferings and Passion. Gricigliano is a "place of dreams," but certainly not of "dreamers." Sentimental nostalgic feelings about the past, as well as of an imaginary future, don't make it too far here. On the contrary, we are trained to humbly be "men of great desires," *desideriorum vir*, which is quite different. Great love and desires that become reality in the form of service; service of the Church. Please pray for me.

## THE INSTITUTE OF CHRIST THE KING SOVEREIGN PRIEST

is a society of apostolic life whose goal is the honor of God and the sanctification of priests in the service of the Church and souls. Its specific aim is missionary: to spread the reign of our Lord Jesus Christ in all spheres of human life. Our work is carried out under the patronage of the Immaculate Conception, to Whom the Institute is consecrated.

The Institute was founded in 1990 by Monsignor Gilles Wach and Father Philippe Mora in Gabon, Africa, where we still have missions. Today, the mother-house and international seminary of the Institute is located in Gricigliano, in the Archdiocese of Florence, Italy.

Recognizing the importance of a deep harmony between faith, liturgy, and life, and the power of beauty in attracting the human senses to the things above, an integral part of the Institute's charism is the use of the extraordinary form of the Latin Rite according to the *motu proprio Summorum Pontificum*.

Great care for a solemn liturgy, complete fidelity to the doctrine of the Church and the Holy Father, and awareness of the central role of Grace, especially Charity – these are essential elements of the Institute's spirituality, which is drawn from its three co-patrons, St. Benedict, St. Thomas Aquinas, and St. Francis de Sales. Our motto, taken from St. Paul, is "Live the truth in charity."

The Institute operates in more than 50 places in 12 countries, where our priests focus on the care of souls in many different ways. To assist our priests in their apostolic work, the Institute also has clerical oblates. In 2004, a community of religious sisters was canonically established to aid the priests in their mission through prayer and apostolic work.



# NEWS from the Vineyard



On March 29 – 30, the Institute of Christ the King conducted a pilgrimage to Lourdes, in commemoration of the 150th anniversary of the apparitions of Our Lady there. The superiors, seminarians, and sisters of the Institute came *en masse* from Gricigliano, along with many of its priests from France, led by their Provincial Superior, Abbé Benoît Jayr. They were all joined by friends and faithful from both sides of the Atlantic numbering well over 1,000. The two days were filled with private and scheduled devotions, including the Rosary, Way of the Cross, and an impressive candle Procession Saturday eve-

ning. Solemn High Masses were celebrated in the upper basilica chapel, at overflowing capacity. On Saturday the celebrant was Vicar General Msgr. Michael Schmitz, while Msgr. Gilles Wach, Prior General, offered Mass that Divine Mercy Sunday. The pilgrims were greeted by the director of the Shrine who gave a warm welcoming speech.

Among the many benefits of Our Holy Father's *motu proprio, Summorum Pontificum*, is an ever greater interest for the Latin Mass on the part of the youth. Several Catholic universities and colleges have offered Mass in the extraordinary form, often at the initiative of the students themselves. At the University of Steubenville, Msgr. Michael Schmitz was recently invited to celebrate what was the first traditional Latin Mass ever offered at that Ohio school. The Institute has also brought the Mass of Ages to secular universities. Father Denis Buchholz celebrated Mass at the University of Kansas, in Lawrence. In Chicago, the Institute has offered the Latin Mass on occasion at the University of Chicago; henceforth, this will be a regular occurrence, thanks to a student association recently formed there in support of Catholic tradition and culture.



## AT THE SHRINE in Chicago

It was a very special Holy Week this year at the Shrine of Christ the King, for it marked the first time that the Holy Triduum was celebrated inside our church since having been entrusted to the Institute of Christ the King to be restored. For the first time after its closure, this magnificent building witnessed the dispelling of "darkness" represented by the lighting of the Paschal candle, as the hallowed strains of the *Exsultet* once again filled its vast space, beautifully fitted with temporary furnishings.
