QUINQUAGESIMA SUNDAY

Introit: *Psalm 30: 3, 4.* Be Thou unto me a God, a protector, and a place of refuge, to save me: for Thou art my strength, and my refuge; and for Thy name's sake Thou wilt be my leader and wilt nourish me. *Ps. 30: 2.* In Thee, O Lord, have I hoped, let me never be confounded: deliver me in Thy justice, and set me free. *V.* Glory be. Be Thou unto me a God.

Collect: Of Thy clemency hearken unto our prayers, O Lord, loose us from the bonds of sin, and keep us from all adversity. Through our Lord.

For the Pope: O God, the Shepherd and Ruler of all the faithful, look down favorably upon Thy servant Francis, whom Thou hast been pleased to appoint pastor over Thy Church; grant, we beseech Thee, that he may benefit both by word and example those over whom he is set, and thus attain unto life eternal, together with the flock committed to his care. Through our Lord.

Epistle: *I Corinthians 13: 1-13.* Brethren, if I speak with the tongues of men, and of angels, and have not charity, I am become as sounding brass or a tinkling cymbal. And if I should have prophecy, and know all mysteries, and all knowledge, and if I should have all faith, so that I could remove mountains, and have not charity; I am nothing. And if I should distribute all my goods to feed the poor, and if I should deliver my body to be burned, and have not charity, it profiteth me nothing. Charity is patient, is kind: charity envieth not; dealeth not perversely; is not puffed up; is not ambitious; seeketh not her own; is not provoked to anger; thinketh no evil; rejoiceth not in iniquity, but rejoiceth in the truth; beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things. Charity never falleth away: whether prophecies shall be made void, or tongues shall cease or knowledge shall be destroyed. For we know in part, and we prophesy in part. But when that which is perfect is come, that which is in part shall be done away. When I was a child, I spoke as a child, I understood as a child, I thought as a child: but when I became a man, I put away the things of a child. We see now through a glass in a dark manner; but then face to face. Now I know in part; but then I shall know even as I am known. And now there remain, faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity.

Gradual: *Psalm 76: 15, 16.* Thou art the God that alone dost wonders: Thou hast made Thy power known among the nations. *V.* With Thy arm Thou hast redeemed Thy people, the children of Israel and of Joseph.

Tract: *Psalm 99: 1, 2.* Sing joyfully to God all the earth: serve ye the Lord with gladness. *V.* Come in before His presence with exceeding great joy: know ye that the Lord He is God. *V.* He made us, and not we ourselves: but we are His people, and the sheep of His pasture.

Gospel: *St. Luke 18: 31-43.* At that time, Jesus took unto Him the twelve, and said to them, Behold we go up to Jerusalem, and all things shall be accomplished which were written by the prophets concerning the Son of man: for He shall be delivered to the gentiles, and shall be mocked, and scourged, and spit upon; and after they have scourged Him, they will put Him to death; and the third day He shall rise again. And they understood none of these things, and this word was hid from them, and they understood not the things that were said. Now it came to pass, when He drew nigh to Jericho, that a certain blind man sat by the wayside, begging. And when he heard the multitude passing by, he asked what this meant. And they told him that Jesus of Nazareth was passing by. And he cried out, saying, Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me. And they that went before, rebuked him, that he should hold his peace: but he cried out much more, Son of David, have mercy on me. And Jesus standing, commanded him to be brought unto Him: and when he was come near, He asked him, saying, What wilt thou that I do to thee? But he said, Lord, that I may see. And Jesus said to him, Receive thy sight: thy faith hath made thee whole. And immediately he saw, and followed Him, glorifying God: and all the people when they saw it, gave praise to God.

Offertory: *Psalm 118: 12, 13.* Blessed art Thou, O Lord, teach me Thy justifications: with my lips I have pronounced all the judgments of Thy mouth.

Secret: May this offering, we beseech Thee, O Lord, cleanse away our sins, sanctify us in soul and body, and fit us, Thy servants, for the celebration of the sacrifice. Through our Lord.

For the Pope: We beseech Thee, O Lord, that Thou mayest be appeased by the gifts we offer, and govern by Thy continual protection Thy servant Francis, whom Thou hast been pleased to appoint pastor over Thy Church. Through our Lord.

Communion: *Psalm 77: 29, 30.* They did eat, and were filled exceedingly, and the Lord gave them their desire: they were not defrauded of that which they craved.

Postcommunion: We beseech Thee, O almighty God, that we, who have partaken of heavenly nourishment, may be fortified by it against all adversities. Through our Lord.

For the Pope: May the reception of this Divine Sacrament protect us, we beseech Thee, O Lord, and ever save and defend Thy servant Francis, whom Thou hast been pleased to appoint pastor over Thy Church, together with the flock committed to his care. Through our Lord.

A LENT WELL SPENT

DAILY MASS AND STATIONS OF THE CROSS

Each day of Lent has a Mass proper to it. The lessons from the Old Testament are perfectly tied to the passages of the Gospel, which trace the entire public life of Our Lord Jesus Christ. There is no better way to observe the Great Fast of Lent than to attend Holy Mass as frequently as possible and to receive Our Lord in Holy Communion, our true nourishment throughout this time of penance. Each day of Lent, the celebrant will offer a short sermon on the Mass of the day.

You are also warmly invited to make the **Stations of the Cross every Friday evening at 6:00 PM**, followed by veneration of the relic of the True Cross. This devotion dates from the earliest Christian times, when Christians went on pilgrimage to Jerusalem and traced the awful path of Our Savior to Calvary. You can gain a plenary indulgence under the usual conditions each time you make the Stations of the Cross.

Bishop Athanasius Schneider was born Anton Schneider in 1961 in Tokmok, Kirghiz SSR in the Soviet Union. His parents were ethnic Germans from Odessa in the Ukraine. After the Second World War they were sent by Stalin to a gulag in Krasnokamsk in the Ural Mountains. In Krasnokamsk, his family was closely involved with the underground church. His mother, Maria, was one of several women who helped shelter Bl. Oleksa Zaryckyj, a Ukrainian priest, who would later be imprisoned in a gulag near Karaganda by the Soviet regime for his ministry and martyred in 1963. The Schneider family traveled to the Kirghiz SSR after being released from the camps. They later left Central Asia for Estonia, where they lived in Tartu. In 1973, shortly after making his first Holy Communion in secret, Anton Schneider emigrated with his family to Rottweil in West Germany.

In 1982, Anton Schneider joined the Canons Regular of the Holy Cross of Coimbra, a Catholic religious order, in Austria. He took the religious name of Athanasius upon joining the order. He was ordained a priest on March 25, 1990. Starting in 1999, he taught Patristics at Mary, Mother of the Church Seminary in Karaganda. On 2 June 2006 he was consecrated Bishop at the Altar of the Chair of Saint Peter in the Vatican by Angelo Cardinal Sodano. In 2011 he was transferred to the position of auxiliary bishop in the Archdiocese of Astana. He is the General Secretary of the Bishops' Conference of Kazakhstan.

Bishop Schneider defends the traditional form of receiving Holy Communion (kneeling, on the tongue) in Roman Catholic liturgy. This is the theme of his book *Dominus est!*, published in Italian and since translated into many languages. He is a regular celebrant of the traditional Latin Mass, including in many apostolates of the Institute of Christ the King.
