

## PRAYERS & INSTRUCTION

### 1,500 YEAR OLD PRAYER TO ST. JOSEPH

*Oh, St. Joseph, whose protection is so great, so strong, so prompt before the throne of God. I place in you all my interests and desires. Oh, St. Joseph, do assist me by your powerful intercession, and obtain for me from your divine Son all spiritual blessings, through Jesus Christ, our Lord. So that, having engaged here below your heavenly power, I may offer my thanksgiving and homage to the most loving of fathers. Oh, St. Joseph, I never weary of contemplating you, and Jesus asleep in your arms; I dare not approach while He reposes near your heart. Press Him in my name and kiss His fine head for me and ask Him to return the Kiss when I draw my dying breath. St. Joseph, Patron of departing souls - Pray for us.*

This prayer was found in the 50th year of Our Lord. In 1505 it was sent from the pope to Emperor Charles while he was going into battle.

Whoever reads this prayer or hears it or carries it, will never die a sudden death, nor be drowned, nor shall poison take effect on them; neither shall they fall into the hands of the enemy, nor be burned in any fire, nor shall they be overpowered in battle.

### *Love is Compliant with God's Inspirations* **SAINT JOSEPH THE WORKER (MAY 1)**

The phrase "St. Joseph the Artisan" usually evokes an image of the pious, dignified person of St. Joseph working quietly as a carpenter, with his square in hand and his other tools aside some chiseled wood in his shop. This picture - he and his attitude toward work -is exactly what we should be emulating. The feast of St. Joseph the Artisan was instituted by Pope Pius XII in 1955. The date was chosen to coincide with the date on which communist countries celebrated the workers' servitude to the state. Making it a feast in honor of this most honored silent worker and provider, St. Joseph, elevates and sanctifies the observance, bringing to light the dignity and moral and spiritual value of work.

# FOURTH SUNDAY AFTER EASTER



**I**ntroit. Ps. 97, 1, 2. Sing ye to the Lord a new canticle, alleluia; for the Lord hath done wonderful things, alleluia; He hath revealed His justice in the sight of the gentiles, alleluia, alleluia. Ps. 97, 1. His right hand hath wrought for Him salvation: and His arm is holy. V. Glory.

**P**rayer. O God, Who dost make the minds of the faithful to be of one accord, grant Thy peoples that they may love what Thou commandest and desire what Thou dost promise, so that, amid the changing things of this world, our hearts may be set where true joys abide. Through our Lord.

**C**onfession. 1 James 1, 17-21. Dearly beloved, Every best gift, and every perfect gift is from above; coming down from the Father of lights, with Whom there is no change, nor shadow of alteration. For of His own will hath He begotten us by the word of truth, that we might be some beginning of His creatures. You know, my dearest brethren; and let every man be swift to hear, but slow to speak, and slow to anger. For the anger of man worketh not the justice of God. Wherefore, casting away all uncleanness, and abundance of naughtiness, with meekness receive the engrafted word, which is able to save your souls.

**A**lleluia, alleluia. V. Ps. 117, 16. The right hand of the Lord hath wrought power; the right hand of the Lord hath exalted me. Alleluia, V. Rom. 6, 9. Christ, rising from the dead, now dieth not; death shall no more have dominion over Him. Alleluia.

**G**ospel. John 16, 5-14. At that time Jesus said to His disciples, I go to Him that sent Me; and none of you asketh Me, Whither goest Thou? But because I have spoken these things to

created for leisure; man was always destined to work. But work is for man, not man for work. We often forget this in our fast-paced and demanding world. Work must either enrich us as persons who are to “subdue the earth,” or it will dehumanize us, as in the case of those who are made slaves.

St. Benedict asserted that idleness was the enemy of the soul and insisted that his monks participate in manual labor every day. Work should be used as a tool to praise God. Man offers up his toils and labors, and his work becomes a prayer ascending to heaven all the day long. This is reflected in the motto of the Benedictines “To labor is to pray.”

St. Francis de Sales claims that labor serves to mortify and subdue the flesh: “Provided the labor you undertake contributes to the glory of God and your own welfare, I would prefer that you should suffer the pain of labor rather than that of fasting,” he said.

Work is part of our spirituality. Through our work, we are to come closer to God, the Creator and Redeemer. For the Christian, work can become a participation in the continuing redemptive work of Jesus. He was always doing the work of the One who sent Him (John 9:3-4) and we are invited by grace to do the same.

you, sorrow hath filled your heart. But I tell you the truth: it is expedient to you that I go; for if I go not, the Paraclete will not come to you, but if I go, I will send him to you. And when He is come, He will convince the world of sin, and of justice, and of judgment. Of sin, because they believed not in Me; and of justice, because I go to the Father, and you shall see Me no longer; and of judgment, because the prince of this world is already judged. I have yet many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now; but when He, the Spirit of truth, is come, He will teach you all truth; for He shall not speak of Himself; but what things soever He shall hear, He shall speak, and the things that are to come He shall show you. He shall glorify Me because He shall receive of Mine, and shall show it to you.
