



HOLY WEEK AND WHAT YOU NEED TO DO

CANON DUMAIN

We have come to the end of Lent. One more week and it will be Easter. A week, but what a week! Today we enter "Great Week", the "Holy Week". It is probably worth thinking about it a little in advance, otherwise this essential Week may pass very quickly!

Easter is not just one feast among others: it is the Feast of feasts. This is why we have been preparing for it for 40 days... A long marathon that is coming to an end soon! The finish line is in sight, so it is time to give all the energy we have left in a last final sprint. This last effort, this final sprint, this final preparation, the Church offers it to us through the riches of her Liturgy. Procession and Palm Sunday Mass, Low or Solemn Masses on Holy Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, Offices of *Tenebrae*, Evening Mass on Holy Thursday, Office of the Cross on Good Friday, Easter Vigil and Mass of the Resurrection: so many opportunities to enter into the mystery of Charity of this extraordinary Week. This Holy Week contains all the striking events of the Passion, death and Resurrection. Unlike the hesitant Apostles, the Church now knows whither the Cross leads, and consequently, she can never completely forsake the note of triumph, joy and victory. We mourn the death of the beloved One, but there is joy in our tears. We smile through our grief, « acclaiming the King in whose death, death is conquered » (St Augustine, sermon). Palm Sunday is primarily a day of triumph although the Passion is also read. It is the Solemn Offertory, before the Solemn Sacrifice. Holy Thursday is given over to the joy of the Last Supper: the great gifts of the Catholic Priesthood and of the Holy Eucharist. Good Friday hymns the triumph of the Cross. Holy Saturday brings us, impatient of further delay, to the Resurrection itself.

"The Liturgy not only recalls the events that saved us, but actualizes them, makes them present. The Paschal Mystery of Christ is celebrated, it is not repeated, it is the celebrations that are repeated in each of them, there is the outpouring of the Holy Ghost which actualizes the one mystery".

If we really want to get rid of our vices; if we want to make some spiritual progress, nothing beats pious attendance at liturgical Offices, especially on these Holy Days. To be converted, nothing will be more beneficial to us than to be present at the foot of the Cross. What is stopping us? Why such a meager attendance in these Holy Days? The excuses are always the same: these are not days of obligation ... it's too long... it's too late...

These are not *days of obligation*... Indeed, nothing compels you to come; nothing if not Charity: Love for this God who became incarnate, who suffered and who died for our sins. Nothing forces you to be full of gratitude, no one forces you to love Him... and no one will force you to enter Heaven. It is not a question of penal obligation, but a question of Charity. It is the least we can do for Him.

It is too long. Indeed, it is long... but not too much, and not too uncomfortable... Whereas for Him, it was just as long, but in untold torture and suffering. These few hours that we spend in the church, our Lord spent them in agony, in the jails of the Temple, manhandled by His guards, scourged by the legionaries, carrying His Cross, and finally, 3 hours, 3 long hours, his feet and hands pierced, hanging on the Cross. Do not tell me it is too long, we are just reliving liturgically, hour by hour, what He experienced physically for our sins.

It is too late... I know that in the Midwest we go to bed early... But one Week of exception per year is not too much to ask. Especially since our Lord has not slept either. Sacrifice a few hours of our sleep for the Love of God; for the consolation of our Redeemer is not asking too much. And the more difficult it is, the more it is necessary to sacrifice it. Do you love your sleep more than your Savior? Show me! Show me which one you prefer. There are still other, more and less, timid excuses: children, work...

Do not prevent children, even small ones, from participating in Offices. With young children, it can certainly be difficult to participate in all the Offices... although we must not underestimate their capacities for listening, meditation and prayer. (Too often, it is the parents themselves who use their children as an excuse; or the parents who refuse to educate their children at the silence, the prayer and the reverence...). Without saturating them, let us not prevent them from participating, in their measure, in the great Liturgy of the Church. Do not deprive them of the essential. Let us ensure that the presence of children is not an easy excuse for dispensing with the Offices of Holy Week.

This week will be very busy! We must think of concrete ways of participating in all or part of the liturgical Offices. This requires organization; manage to be available and punctual. Let us consider that these Holy Week Offices are, really, appointments that God gives us... and we will find the means to be present, and on time! Let us organize the week according to the Masses... and not the other way around!

Details, all that? Of course, the material preparation for Holy Week is not the most important thing. But it sets the benchmarks that will allow you to fully receive the essential. Indeed, the question is not to subscribe to some legal obligations (we "must" go to Mass), but to make ourselves available to what God wants to give us. Through the Liturgy, God wants to make present for us the mystery of the death and resurrection of His Son. And in front of our hesitations to answer His call, He remains painfully astonished: "O my people, what have I done to you? How have I saddened you? Answer me. (...) Would so much love remain unanswered?"

All visitors who are not of the Catholic faith are welcome to join us in prayer, but are requested not to receive Holy Communion. Because the reception of Holy Communion is the sign of Divine and Ecclesial unity, only practicing Catholics who are free of mortal sin, and in full communion with the Catholic Church should present themselves for Holy Communion.

We pray for the full visible unity among all Christians.
